good morning	ohayoo gozaimasu
good afternoon	konnichiwa
good evening	konbanwa
good night	oyasuminasai
It is fine weather, isn't it?	li tenki desu ne
It is raining heavily, isn't it?	hidoi ame desu ne
It is a fine view, isn't it?	li keshiki desu ne
It is cold, isn't it?	samui desu ne
It is hot, isn't it?	atsui desu ne
Are you sightseeing?	kankoo desu ka
Are you taking a walk?	sanpo desu ka
Are you going for a hike?	haikingu desu ka
yes	ee
yes/here	hai
Yes, that's right.	ee, soo desu/hai, soo desu
Yes, it is so, isn't it.	ee, soo desu ne
yes, indeed	ee, hontoo ni
How are you? (literal: are you fine?)	genki desu ka

see you later (literal: well then again)	jaa, mata
goodbye	sayoonara
well then, goodbye	jaa, sayoonara
tomorrow	ashta
see you again tomorrow (literal: again tomorrow)	mata ashta
next week	raishuu
Well then, see you again next week.	jaa, mata raishuu
Monday (literal: moon day)	getsu-yoobi
Tuesday (literal: fire day)	ka-yoobi
Wednesday (literal: water day)	sui-yoobi
Thursday (literal: wood day)	moku-yobi
Friday (literal: gold day)	kin-yoobi
Saturday (literal: earth day)	do-yoobi
Sunday (literal: sun day)	niche-yoobi
Well then, see you on Monday.	jaa, getsu-yoobi ni
Well then, see you again on Friday.	jaa, mata kin-yoobi ni
